Why does it happen?

Evolutionary Aspect:

Psychological Impact:

Signs of Negativity Bias

How to Spot It?

Overemphasis on Problems:

Team discussions consistently lean towards highlighting problems or challenges rather than focusing on achievements or solutions.

Selective Attention:

Individuals exhibit a tendency to pay more attention to and remember negative feedback or events, overshadowing positive experiences.

Pessimistic Outlook and Decreased Morale:

Team members may develop a generally pessimistic outlook, expecting the worst outcomes.

Decreased morale among team members due to a constant emphasis on negatives, impacting overall motivation and engagement.
